Safety Is Not An Option

The three basic general rules of safe gun handling.

Always point the muzzle in a **safe direction;** never point a firearm at anyone or anything you don't want to shoot.

Keep your finger off the trigger and outside the trigger guard until you are ready to shoot.

Keep the action open and the gun unloaded until you are ready to use it.

Quaker Hill hosted a very successful National Skeet Shooting Association meet which was organized and run by Paul Brulotte and assisted by a large number of Club members and representatives from the Ledyard club who worked pulling targets, keeping score, loading skeet machines, and cooking.

Quaker Hill winners were 12 guage. Champion Paul LaChance with Paul Brulotte the runner up. First place finishers were John Vincent in AA ,Doug Britt in A ,Cory Britt in B, David Buonome in C, Michael McCann in S, and Chester D'Agostino in E. Jason Chumura was second in C class.

20 Gauge competition saw Rich Civitello claim first place with Paul Brulotte second. Doug Brit took A, Michael Surfine B while Paul Duggan and Robert Vece were first in C and D respectively. Jason Churmura was second in class B.

A special tip of the hat is given by Skeet Chair Doug Britt to the practical pistol shooters who closed their range for the day to provide extra parking and to eliminate any distracting noise.

Skeet Chair Doug Britt reminds all that there is still time to sign up for summer skeet league which starts May 15th and ends August 28th. The league dinner will be September 7th at 12 P.M.

QH at CT State Games

Quaker Hill smallbore shooters distinguished themselves at the recent Connecticut State Games . Ernie Mellor, Jenn Sloan and Eric Sloan competed in both the prone and position events while the two Sloans also shot air rifle.

Jenn and Eric went head on head in the 60 shot three position match, 20 shots probe, standing, and kneeling, with Jenn topping the field, and winning the gold medal, with a 578-24X narrowly defeating Eric by a slim margin of 13Xs. The mother outshot the son on both prone and kneeling, but had the match been tied on Xs it would have gone to the son who had a commanding lead based on his standing stage winning score of 191-3Xs. Jenn won the kneeling stage with a score of 195-11X. Mellor, who beat Jenn prone, fired an aggregate score of 567-20 for the senior title.

In prone competition Mellor took the silver medal in the senior category while Jenn did the same placed third in the in female category. Eric took home the bronze medal in the junior category.

Eric earned his gold medal in the air rifle competition which is 60 shots fired at ten meters. Not to be out done took female honors.

While all met with success in the training match leading up to the National Championship at Camp Perry in July one wonders what the conversation was like in the Sloan car on the way home.

Practical Pistol

The following safety issue is effective immediately. No loaded firearms, of any type, will be allowed to be brought onto the range during any supervised match. There will be no exceptions to this rule to include concealed carry firearms. If the firearm you plan to use for a match is your carry firearm you must bring it to the range in a safe and unloaded condition. Range Officers are instructed to report violators to the Range Chairman for possible disciplinary actions.

The Large Bore Summer Pin League will start Monday July 8th. We will shoot every Monday at 5:30PM. There will be separate classes for auto and revolver. Entry fee for the season is \$10 per gun. We shoot a maximum of five rounds each night in each class you sign up for. New members needing work hours are welcome as pinsetters are always needed.

22 Rimfire Plate Shoot dates are July 28, August 25, September 29 and the October 27th charity shoot. Shooting starts at 9:00 AM. Shooting will be one on one with each shooter having four 4"x 6" plates on the lower section, two 6"x 6" plates on the upper section to knock over first and then a 4"x 6" hinged tie breaking plate. The first shooter to knock over their plates will win the string. Each shooter will shoot six strings and the one with the most wins gets first place and so on. In the event of a tie there will be a timed shoot off. Pistols will be at 15 yards and rifles will be 25 yards. Clip fed semi auto pistols and rifles are preferred, tube fed rifles and revolvers are welcome with any sights allowed. Entry fee will be \$5 per shooter. The payout will be determined by how many shooters participate. A \$1.00 event fee will be charged nonmembers to cover insurance. Concealed Tactical (ConTact) defensive pistol matches are conducted on Saturday mornings starting at 9 AM. Set up is at 8:30 so come early to help. Matches use IDPA targets and rules except for equipment - any reasonable, concealable carry gun is permitted. Hi-capacity magazines, ported barrels, low profile optical sights, etc. are OK. Usually four scenarios are shot per match, with from six to 18 rounds fired per scenario. If the weather forecast is iffy, an email will be sent out to past participants on Friday informing them if match will be held. Contact Ernie Beckwith with any questions at tfo44@comcast.net.

CT Big Bore League

After three matches Quaker Hill currently maintains its lead in the Connecticut Big Bore League as a team while QH member Hap Rocketto is top individual with a 386average closely followed by team mates Phil Kohanski and Steve Rocketto with 383s..

The League shoots on the 3rd Sunday of each month, April through September. Remaining match dates are July 21, August 18, and September 22. There is also opportunity available to shoot on an off day if you have obligations on match day.

The course of fire is 40 shots slow fire, ten shots in each of four positions, prone, sitting, kneeling, and standing at 100 yards. Coaching is allowed. Sign up is at 8AM with the match starting at 9AM.

You may use any centerfire rifle with metallic sights. A telescopic option is available. Fancy equipment is not required, just a desire to compete and shoot with likeminded people in a four position slow fire league shot a 100 yards.

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BELL CITY AND PAMPLONA

The last prone match that most folks in the New England area shoot before departing for Perry is the Bell City Rifle Club's New England NRA Metric Prone Regional. The match precedes the National Championships by a week or so and usually falls on the second or third weekend of July.

By happenstance some 85 years or so before this year's match Ernest Hemingway and some friends attended the *Fiesta de San Fermin* in Pamplona, Spain. The festival is a celebration of the patron saint of the Basque region of Navarre, of which Pamplona is capitol. After a week of overindulgence in food, wine, and bull fighting Hemingway followed his writing dictum in which he stated that, "My aim is to put down on paper what I see and what I feel in the best and simplest way." The end result was *The Sun Also Rises*. While not one of my favorite Hemingway works, my choices being *The Old Man and the Sea* and *For Whom the Bells Toll*, it was the work that first gave the world a view of his lean and athletic writing style, launched his career, and made the running of the bulls a required stop on any self respecting adventurer's itinerary.

As strange as that may sound July events scheduled at both Pamplona and Bell City have something in common, besides the dates, and it is the bulls.

In Pamplona spectators peer from the balconies overlooking *Calle Estafeta* each morning during the second week in July and eagerly await the *encierro*, or the running of the bulls. Daily, for that week, six fighting bulls, as well as six bullocks, run about a half of a mile from a holding pen to the *Plaza de Toros de Pamplona*, where they will fight that same afternoon. Running amidst the bulls will be several hundred young men out to prove their *machismo*.

In order to participate in this event one must be 18 years old, run in the same direction as the bulls, do nothing to incite the bulls, and not be under the influence of alcohol. The first three make a lot of sense but I really wonder why anyone in a sober state would even think of dashing down a half mile of cobblestone street dodging six tons of excited, jumpy, and possibly angry, pot roast.

The Pamplona website warns possible participants, in a rather wry and understated announcement, that, "Not everyone can run the *encierro*. It requires cool nerves, quick reflexes and a good level of physical fitness. Anyone who does not have these three should not take part; it is a highly risky enterprise."

The runners, dressed all in white with red sashes or bandanas, carrying rolled up newspapers for some unknown reason, assemble at the gates of the holding corral to wisely ask for the protection of the Patron Saint by three times chanting "We ask *San Fermín*, being our patron saint, to guide us in the bull run and give us his bless-ing" before a small statue of the saint. Just as there are no atheists in foxholes, there are also none in the streets of Pamplona during the running of the bulls.

At eight o'clock a rocket is shot into the air to announce that the bulls have been released, as if the sight and sound of 12 snorting bovines wouldn't be enough, and with that the melee and mayhem begins. About three or four minutes later another rocket is launched to signal that the bulls are in their pens at the Plaza and the running has concluded. Well, except for the 50 or so runners each day who hobble, or are carried, off to the local hospital to attend to various cuts, bruises, contusions, and sprains which daily attend this event. The rest of the crowd will be off to a local bistro for three fingers of a liquid bracer, breakfast, and to brag on their bravado.

Now, you ask, "What has all this adventure in Spain got to do with a prone match in rural Connecticut?" As I said earlier, it is the bulls. While the Pamplona runners face six bulls just once, a rifleman on the line at Bell City must stare down 18 each day for two days, 27 if you count the sighter bulls.

The metric target being what it is, and the conditions at Bell City being what they are, it takes a lot of, as the Pamplona website said, "cool nerves, quick reflexes and a good level of physical fitness" to lie there wrapped in sweatshirt and shooting jacket, stock still, in the heat and humidity of a July afternoon facing down those bulls.

However, from time to time, after taking a long hard look at the score board, I have wondered if I might not have been better off if I had just swapped my leather shooting coat, sweat shirt, and rifle for a white shirt and trousers, red sash, and a rolled up newspaper.
